Henri Matisse was our focus artist this month at Mandala. The students worked in art class with Miss Jeannet to create their own works of art with Matisse style, such as cut out shapes and bright colors. Below, our Matisse art is above the real Matisse, which we saw this week on our field trip to Albright-Knox Art Gallery.





Matisse began the paper cut-outs after being diagnosed with abdominal cancer in 1941. Painting and sculpting were too difficult for Henri so with he, along with his assistants, created the paper works.

Matisse was born in 1869. *Notre-Dame, une fin d'après-midi,* translates to "A Glimpse of Notre-Dame in the Late Afternoon" is the painting to the right (1902). It is oil on canvas. This, with other paintings, was created in France in the early 1900s. The style was Fauvism.


