Mambrino King was a magnificent horse born in Great Britain who lived 120 years ago. He was a gray thoroughbred racehorse. People came from all over the globe to see him. He was a trotter and a pacer. He had a lot of children, over 250. The East Aurora Advertiser called him the most handsome horse in the world. He was named after a king that lived in Africa and loved horses. Mambrino the horse was so famous that he even gave his name to a chocolate and wine bar in East Aurora, NY. Mambrino king lived at Hamlin stok farm. With chimes, almont, Junior and belle hamlin. In the late 1800s East Aurora was a harness-racing mecca. There was also Henry c. Jewett house.
