This is an add-on story that started with "the person _____". First we added a bunch of verbs in the blank then changed "the person" to other nouns. We choose from that list to start the story.







In Earth Science we've been learning about ocean currents, temperature, salinity, and density. We did three experiments. For one of the experiments we had a bottle of cold seltzer and a bottle of room temperature seltzer. We poured 150 mL of each into separate beakers. We swirled the beakers and timed how long it took for the bubbles to settle. We repeated this every ten minutes. The water that fizzed for longer could hold more dissolved gas over time. The cold seltzer was the winner!

For the other experiments, here's what we concluded: colder water can hold more dissolved gas. Warm water can hold more dissolved salt. The colder the water, the denser it is. Saltwater is more dense than freshwater. The differences in density drive ocean currents.
