Mandala because he likes all the sports that Bryce likes and they can play them together. Bryce plays basketball, soccer, swimming, and tennis.


Over the years Bryce has learned French and Spanish, and now he is learning German. He has also learned guitar and piano. He still takes lessons and practices both instruments.

Bryce's favorite holiday is Christmas. Bryce is an iconic staple at Mandala, when you come to visit you just have to check him out!



The youngest group has started an author study of author and illustrator Kevin Henkes. This week we read *Chrysanthemum*, *Lilly's Purple Plastic Purse*, and *Owen*. We read a biography about Kevin Henkes, watched a video about what inspires him, and set up a Lightbulb Lab in our classroom!





The middle group is learning about plant and animal cells. With a partner, we made a poster of a cell and had to compare it to a city. The mitochondria in our cell city was the nuclear power plant because it provides energy for the cell. By Stella



For our cell city we made the nucleus the government building because it controls the cell. The chloroplasts would be the solar panels because they take energy from the sun. The endoplasmic reticulum would be a factory because it makes proteins and lipids. The vacuole would be a lake because it stores salts and water.
